

Dr. Joey Shaw

Dr. Joey Shaw is Distinguished Service UC Foundation Professor in the Department of Biology, Geology, & Env. Science at UT-Chattanooga. He received his MS and PhD in Botany from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville in 2005. His research, spanning plant taxonomy, systematics, ecology, and biogeography, has resulted in over 30 scientific publications, and his *Guide to the Vascular Plants of Tennessee*, 2nd edition, is expected to be published in 2025. Joey has been part of the renowned Spring Wildflower Pilgrimage in Great Smoky Mountains National Park since 1998, becoming Chair in 2015 and Director in 2017. April 2025 will mark the 75th anniversary of the Pilgrimage, the oldest and largest public outreach event of its kind in the US. He is also a long-time instructor at HBS, teaching field courses on ferns, wetland plants, and collections databasing. Joey's honors include the 2023 Elizabeth Ann Bartholomew Award of the Southern Appalachian Botanical Society and a UT Alumni Association Distinguished Service Professorship in 2024.

Barbara J. Sullivan hails from Wilmington, NC. A former Foreign Service Officer and attorney, Barbara holds an MFA from UNC-Wilmington and a JD from George Washington University Law School. She is also a a graduate of the NCSU Extension Service Master Gardener Program, sometime garden commentator for WHQR Public Radio, and a contributor to SALT, Carolina Gardener, and Living Southern Style magazines. Winner of the 2004 Garden Writers of America Garden Globe Award, Barbara has authored the books Garden Perennials for the Coastal South (UNC Press, 2003) and Climate Change Gardening for the South (UNC Press, 2023).
